In the five years since we first began to plan the original Open City Documentary Festival the global art form of cinematic documentary has flourished. There is a widespread and popular yearning for the big stories of our time to be told with a length, complexity and art that does justice to them.

Throughout the UK we've witnessed an expansion of documentary screenings and in London, this year, a remarkable documentary cinema treble: our old friends at Bertha's DocHouse have opened a super comfortable dedicated screen at the reconstructed Curzon Bloomsbury; our longtime partners, Picturehouse, have a dedicated screen at the lovingly transformed Trocadero; and the Regent Street Cinema, within Westminster University, has re-opened with a full repertory programme.

Taking advantage of these opportunities, this year, for the first time, the entire programme of Open City takes us out and about across London. Please enjoy visiting the refurbished, the reopened, the old favourites and the informal venues for our screenings this year. There's one near you!

The importance of public investment in cinematic documentary is seen in the remarkable style and form of the films being supported and made in Croatia. We invite you to witness what has been called a golden age of Croatian cinema.

We are expanding the industry programme with a series of unique events that make the most of our location in London, a city which a thriving community of filmmakers call home. I am particularly proud of one of these curated collaborations: a day focused on virtual reality technology and how it can be used for documentary storytelling. In partnership with UCL Computer Science, we'll be introducing filmmakers to the latest technological innovations and exploring the way that these technologies can immerse audiences and take them on a rich narrative journey.

Finally, I would like to thank: the jurors from near and far who give their time and lend us the wisdom of their judgement; our partners in programming and screening; and the faculties of UCL whose support makes this festival possible.

Sam Klemke's Time Machine Matthew Bate / 2014 / Australia / 94" Tue 16 June / 18:30 / Bloomsbury Theatre

'This year will be my year, it has to be!'

In 1977, NASA launched the Voyager craft into deep space carrying the Golden Record, a portrait of humanity that would try to explain to extra terrestrials who we are. In the same year Sam Klemke began obsessively filming and documenting his life on film. Over the next 35 years we see Sam grow from an optimistic teen to a self-important 20 year old, into an obese, self-loathing 30-something and onwards into his philosophical 50s. From director Matthew Bate (Shut Up Little Man! An Audio Misadventure), Sam Klemke's Time Machine follows two unique self-portraits as they travel in parallel - one hurtling through the infinity of space and the other stuck in the suburbs of Earth – in a freewheeling look at time, memory, mortality and what it means to be human.

Closing Gala: The Closer We Get Karen Guthrie / 2015 / UK / 87" Sun 22 June / 18:00 / Regents Street Cinema

When filmmaker Karen Guthrie's mother Ann suffers a devastating stroke, Karen isn't the only one who comes back home to help care for Ann in the crisis: Her father - the endearing yet unfathomable lan, who has been separated from Ann for years - also reappears. Reunited so unexpectedly, and armed with her camera, Karen seizes this last chance to go under the skin of the family story before it's too late, to come to terms with the aftermath of the secret her father had tried - and failed - to keep from them all. With candour, warmth and much unexpected humour, Karen's role as family confidante, busybody, therapist and spy brings to life both an extraordinary story and a profound portrait of family survival.



Croatia : In Focus

The development of the Croatian Audiovisual Centre in 2008 has helped oversee the emergence of a new generation of Croatian documentary filmmakers, producing an extraordinary range of bold and innovative work. A collaboration between Croatian artist and filmmaker Željka Suková and Brazilian Gustavo Beck, Winter/ Miracle is an allegorical docufiction that presents a very modern portrait of the Christian holiday. The two directors journey between the carnivals of Rijeka and Rio to create a visceral, surreal and above all stunningly cinematic meditation on ritual and faith.



The protagonist of this film is the small, crowded Croatian bus terminal in Rijeka, a town on the threshold of change. The Žabica bus station is a crossroads for tourists and an integral part of the local community. We follow the daily routines of the employees in the station's shops, cafés, the ticket office, the bus drivers, the cabbies, the homeless, the permanent visitors and passersby, to reveal a strange community vainly yet persistently, trying to repair the cracks in a wornout system.


Mitch - The Diary of a Schizophrenic Patient is an autobiographical portrait of a 40-year-old artist living with schizophrenia, who under the quidance of co-director Damir Čučić undergoes several years of 'film therapy'. For two years Mitch filmed constantly, recording the daily life within the psychiatric hospital where he lives. This is a journey into his world, and a journey into the margins of a country caught up in the traumatic aftermath of recent history.

Early Works : The Dardennes

This year we're launching a new strand focusing on the documentary beginnings of established fiction filmmakers with our profile on the Dardenne's. The brothers produced and directed over 60 documentaries before making their move over to fiction in the late 1980s. These screenings offer a rare opportunity to see a selection of their early documentary work, the traces of which can be found running through the concerns and themes of their later celebrated fiction films.



Early Works: The Dardennes #1 Fri 19 June / 20:50 / ICA When the Boat of Léon M. Went Down the Meuse River for the First Time / Jean-Pierre and Luc Dardenne / 1979 / Belgium / 40"

This early poetic documentary follows the 1960 general strike in Belgium's Meuse River industrial region by juxtaposing archival footage of the events against interviews with locals who recount their memories of the strike and the labor union and government response. Structuring the film and serving as its meditative center is the solo, self-sufficient voyage of a former striker up the river to Liège in a hand-built boat.

Screening with:

R... Ne Répond Plus Jean-Pierre and Luc Dardenne 1982 / Belgium / 52"

This documentary further reveals the Dardennes' fascination with alternative modes for sharing and distributing information. Where *For The War To End The Walls Should Have Crumbled* recounts the history of a workers' newspaper, *R...No Longer Answers* focuses on Europe's vast network of amateur, independent and pirate radio broadcasters. The film is a collage, filmed at a variety of locations, from radio studios to snowy landscapes where transmitters are set up. Just as the broadcasters bring together far-flung communities of listeners, the Dardennes' montage creates a whole out of this network of spaces and people.

Look at Jonathan Jean-Pierre and Luc Dardenne / 1983 / Belgium / 52"

The Dardennes' spirited portrait film depicts Jean Louvet, a Walloon dramatist who fuses Brechtian aesthetics with Sartrean existentialism to capture the working class experiences and heart of Belgium's Francophone community during the mid - and late 20th century. An experimental biopic of sorts, *Look at Jonathan* uses excerpts from Louvet's work, including some autobiographical writings, to tell the story of his life and to document the work of his theater company in La Louvière.



Early Works: The Dardennes #3 Sun 21 June / 16:30 / Cine Lumiere

For The War to End the Walls Should Have Crumbled Jean-Pierre and Luc Dardenne 1980 / Belgium / 52"

Looking back to the momentous events of Belgium's general strike in 1960, For the War to End... focuses on the efforts of Edmond G. and colleagues at the Cockerill steel plant in Seraing to organize and secretly publish a workers' newspaper between 1961 and 1969. A stirring depiction of communal resistance, For the War to End... also provides an insightful portrait of the Dardennes' hometown, revisiting the sites of labor and tracing the routes of the newspaper's circulation, providing a poetic tribute to Seraing's industrial urban landscape.

Lessons From A University on the Fly Jean-Pierre and Luc Dardenne 1982 / Belgium / 55"

Lessons From a University on The Fly compiles a series of intimate portraits of Polish immigrants living in Belgium. Filmed for television by the Dardennes in 1982, the film links the Dardennes' documentaries with their depiction of the beleaguered protagonists of their subsequent fiction films, and marks the beginning of the Dardennes' interest in the lives of immigrants.


Those Who Feel the Fire Burning Morgan Knibbe / 2014 / Netherlands / 74" Wed 17 June / 18:15 / Regent Street Cinema

As a group of refugees try to enter Europe illegally by boat, a storm appears from nowhere and an old man falls overboard. Those Who Feel The Fire Burning is a poetic investigation into a serious and prevalent social problem: the plight of refugees who have survived this perilous journey in search of a better life. Director Morgan Knibbe takes us on a hallucinatory trip along the borders of Europe and into the everyday reality experienced by many castaway refugees, their voices blending together with Kinibbe's extraordinary camera work to create a unique vision of migrant life today.

Brandy Burre had a recurring role on HBO's 'The Wire' when she gave up her career to start a family in upstate New York. When she decides to reclaim her life as an actor, the domestic world she's carefully created crumbles around her. Using elements of melodrama and cinema verité, *Actress* is both a present tense portrait of a dying relationship and an exploration of a complicated woman, performing the role of herself, in a complexyet-familiar story. It's a film about starring in the movie of your life.

Of Men And War Laurent Becue-Renard / 2014 / France / Switzerland / 142" Wed 17 June / 20:00 / Hackney Picturehouse

The wars in Iraq and Afghanistan have brought over 2.6 million new veterans home to the United States. According to Pentagon estimates, up to a third of combat veterans struggle with warrelated post-traumatic stress. At The Pathway Home, a first-of-its-kind PTSD treatment center for returning veterans, the patients work with therapist Fred Gusman to resolve the memories of violence and horror that still haunt them. Over ten years in the making, Of Men and War offers a unique opportunity for veterans to tell their stories - for themselves, for each other, and for us.



Stranded in Canton Måns Månsson / 2014 / Sweden, Denmark, China / 72" Wed 17 June / 20:30 / Regent Street Cinema

Lebrun is a new player on the burgeoning Chinese-African trade route brokering an enormous order for Congolese presidential campaign t-shirts. But he gets stung when the order is held up in production until months after the election. Instead of returning to Kinshasa as a rich man with a bright future, he remains in limbo in Guangzhou, facing nothing but mounting debts for warehousing the useless garments. Director Måns Månsson and co-writer Hongqi Li (Winter Vacation) employ documentary elements and improvisation to create this tragi-comic tale of a man out of his depth and a long way from home, whilst also providing a wry insight into the fascinating relationship that has arisen between China and Africa.

Alice is a care robot who moves in with the single women as an experiment for potential future caregiving options for the elderly. Although hesitant at first, the women all open up to Alice, who makes conversation and listens attentively to her new companions' stories, thoughts and concerns. This touching and poignant exploration of our relationship to robots doesn't provide easy answers but offers a look into what the future could hold.



This observational, almost wordless documentary takes us into the strange and fascinating world of Arabic Falconry, from the catching of a field mouse in Iran to the bizarre competitive falcon shows in Abu Dhabi. Each stage is presented as a new chapter with long unbroken takes capturing the precision and patience required for each step of the process. Once captured the Falcons embark on an incredible journey through dealers, markets, and in some cases, cosmetic surgeons, en route to their strange new lives overseas. Cechanok is a restrained and poetic study of a unique and fascinating cultural practice.

Together Denis Shabaev / 2014 / Russia / 52" Thur 18 June / 19:30 / GRAD

"Why can't you run away from yourself?" nine-year-old Anna asks her father, the filmmaker, as they set out on a road journey that will take them from Russia through Germany to Scandinavia. Rest stops, playgrounds, motel rooms, highways by day and by night – eating, sleeping, playing, cuddling – the two film each other incessantly. Interspersed with an occasional song from Radiohead, recurring fragments of philosophical conversations, hints at the mother's illness. Where is the journey leading them? Father and daughter don't quite seem to know themselves. And little Anna still has to make a difficult decision... Located somewhere between diary and experimental film, Shabaev's debut film provides a warm and humorous look into the complicated and magical world of a child.

Death of the Serpent God Damien Froidevaux / 2014 / France / 90" Thur 18 June / 20:30 / Cine Lumiere

Following a fight that ends badly, twenty-year-old Koumba is deported to Senegal. Having lived in France since early childhood, the troubled teenager now finds herself in a remote village, far removed from her family and Paris life. Surrounded by her disapproving distant relatives and unable to control her anger, Koumba struggles to keep hold of her life as her chances of returning to normalcy dwindle.
